

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# Roberth McClellan Kisabeth Sr

# Roberth McClellan Kisabeth Sr,.

was born 8 June 1920 in Loudon township, Seneca County, Ohio, the fifth son of William Earl and Carrie May (McClellan) Kisabeth. At eight he moved to Plymouth, Michigan. He was educated at Starkweather Elementary, Plymouth High School and Wilbur Writght Tech, and was employed at Wall Wire Products Company, Plymouth in 1939 - 1941. After his military service "Bob" returned to Wall wire in 1945, In 1956 the company merged and relocated to Newport, Tennessee. Having progressed from production laborer (1939) to jig and fixture make (1940) to Tool and Die Maker (1947) to Machine Shop Foreman and Tool Designer (1956), Robert was asked to relocated with the company as part of a cadre of eight to set up and begin operations in Tennessee. Continued to be employed at WT and MP Co. which had become a subsidiary of Phillips Petroleum Company he was promoted to Tool Engineer to Chief Engineer to VP Engineering with primary responsibilities of new product development and improvement and expansion of manufacturing facilities. Robert M. Kisabeth was promoted to V.P. Manufacturing and Engineering and finally to President. A decision by parent company to divest of most subsidiaries not directly related to a petro-chemical product resulted in him receiving direction to sell all company assets. This was complete in 1985 at which time he accepted a position of consultant with the CSC Management Group of Racine, Wisconsin

Robert M. Kisabeth married Jimmye Joye Harris daughter of James Henry and Lita Marie (Holt) Harris on 19 January 1945. While residing in Plymouth four sons were born; Robert McClellan Jr., David James, Charles William and Craig Harris (all at Sessions Hospital in Northville, Michigan). A fifth son Steven Holt was born in 1957 at Baptist Hospital Knoxville, Tennessee.

His lifetime activities have included: Kiwanis Club, Chairman Industrial Management group, Chairman Boy scouts of America Troop )Order of the Life member—Disabled American Veterans and Veterans of Foreign Wars, appointed Colonel Aide de Camp - Governor's Staff Tennessee (Winfield Dunn 1972). Bob was raised as a Master Mason in 1952 in Northville, MI Lodge F.&A.M. demitted to Tennessee Newport Lodge #234 F.&A.M. in 1959. He served two years as Worshipful Master (1969 and 1973), Past High Priest of the Chapter of Royal Arch Masons (1964), Past Thrice Illustrious Master of the Council of Royal and Select Master s(1969), and Past Eminent Commandery of the Commander of Knights Templar, Morristown, Tennessee (1970). He was awarded the Order of the High Priesthood (1970), the order of the Silver Trowel (1971), the Knight York Cross of Honour (1972), and the Order of the Knight Crusaders (1986). Bob was constituted a Noble of the Mystic Shrine, Kerbela Temple, Knoxville, TN (1961) and appointed Ambassador for life.

#### Military:

Robert McClellan Kisabeth entered the U.S. Army October, 1941. He trained at Camp Custer, MI, Camp Walters, TX and Fort Dix, NJ prior to being assigned to the famed 34th (Red Bull) Infantry Division (Minnesota & Iowa National Guard Division) and embarked for North Ireland in the spring of 1942 as part of the first contingent of American ground forces assigned to the European Theater of Operations. Bob had additional training with British and Canadian troops and was periodically detailed to Military Intelligence assignment near the Irish Free state border and communities near encampments. He was detached to undergo Ranger training to Scotland and North Ireland and was assigned to the Ryder Ranger Battalion, which had been formed to spearhead the assault on the harbor of Algiers, Algeria and surrounding installations as part of "Operation Torch," mission code named "Terminal." He was transported to Gibraltar aboard the English Cruiser Sheffield, transferred to an English destroyer for the assault which began at 3:00 a.m., 8 November 1942. He was named to the Honor Guard after actions in the harbor and at Sidi Ferruch, El Biar and Palais de Ete. He then was detailed to Military Intelligence assignments near the Spanish Moroccan border.

Bob was assigned to a long range reconnaissance unit of the french XIX Corps under General Koeltz with a contingent of native Gaumier troops operating in Tunisia (Dec 1942) Pichon Hajebel Airen area. Under General Crocker his unit was reassigned to the British IX Corps with patrol action liaison French intelligence and reinforced platoon strikes and withdrawals to determine enemy strengths and dispositions. Upon arrival of the 34th Infantry Division in the area he was reassigned to that division a part of the U.S. Army II Corps under General Patton/Bradley/Bob served as part of point units for assaults on Tunisia near Pichon Hills 531 and 455 near Hill 609, at Hill 609 and two assaults at Fondouk. He was seriously wounded in action and returned to the United States through Casablanca, Morroco to Halloren General Hospital, Staten Island, N.Y., to Woodrow Wilson General and finally to Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington D.C. and Silver Springs, MD (1943). Robert returned to active duty in late summer 1944 and was assigned to army facilities located in Florida, Mississispipi and Tennessee with details to other southern states in Military Police activities. Classified as 50% disabled because of previous injuries, Bob was honorable discharge though Fort Sheridan, Illinois, in January, 1945. I would like to take the opportunity to thank all those who sacrificed their weekend in order to travel to our reunion site. Much traveled family members included:



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# What is Graphoanalysis?

William took pride in his family heritage and family name. Hewas highly intuitive and it would be difficult to hoodwink him in any business matter. William had a positive outlook at life.


