Greetings



Foster Bryan Kisabeth

Foster Bryan Kisabeth was born near Hicksville, Ohio on May 29, 1909 to William Earl and Carrie May (McClellan) Kisabeth. A more precise birthplace would be at his parents' home near Six Corners, Mark Township, Defiance Co., Ohio. His paternal ancestors were early Seneca County, Ohio residents of German origin having arrived in America in 1842 offering a strong theory as to explanation of his rather different given name. Charles Foster, Ohio governor and very prominent citizen of the Fostoria area was undoubtedly an influence on his parents choosing a name for their first born. Also his middle name Bryan could be derived from Bryan, Ohio (a nearby town in the agricultural area near Defiance County where his grandfather's farm was located). Incidently, his uncle Estel's middle name was Bryan and Foster's son Kenneth has kept this traditional name in the family by naming his second son Bryan.

Foster's maternal ancestors were of Scotch-Irish, Swiss and German origin with inklings of both English and Dutch. Strong indications suggest that his maternal great grandmother Charity Yoder was of the Amish religion.

His grandfather William Kisabeth set up his farm in Six Corners after migrating to Defiance County around 1880. His great grandfather Johann Philipp Kisseberth (Philip Kisabeth Sr.) also traveled with son William and purchased 40 acres in the area. His father, William Earl Kisabeth was a tenant farmer in both Defiance and Seneca Counties before finally settling in the Plymouth, Michigan area in 1929.

From a very early age Foster became actively engaged in the management of the farm and spent countless hours tending to the everyday chores associated with the agriculture industry. The family lived in the Hicksville area until about 1917 at which time they moved east to the Loudon Township area of Seneca County where once again tenant farming was the priority. As a matter of fact, the William Earl Kisabeth lived and farmed in the very same house and farm that their ancestor Johann Philipp Kisseberth first toiled the American soil in 1844.

A tragic mishap occurred when only a young man of seventeen, Foster had his thumb and first two fingers blown off as a result of blasting caps exploding while attempting to remove them from his pocket. He had found the seemingly harmless metal explosives on the railroad tracks earlier that day. While the family moved to the New Reigel area and then to the Old Fort/ Greensprings area Foster opted to remain in Fostoria living with a local dentist and his family. In 1928 he graduated from Fostoria High School studying college preparatory courses and was a member of the Literary Society his senior year.

Shortly after Foster's graduation the entire family relocated to Plymouth, Michigan. His grandparents, Leander and Barbara (Hart) McClellan were living in the vicinity, he being a local shoemaker (cobbler) in the "Lowertown" section of Plymouth. In the 1931 Polk Plymouth Directory Foster is listed residing with his parents on 198 South Mill Street working as a clerk for the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company. He was with A & P from 1929 until 1940 acting as a clerk and assistant manager. Foster worked from 1940 until 1945 with the Ford Motor Company as a checker and second foreman before settling in his career position with Pilgrim Drawn Steel. As their Traffic Manager Foster spent thirty years for the Plymouth based firm which was taken over by the larger Wyckoff Steel Division in the early 1970's.

Foster Bryan Kisabeth married the former Bertha Dobozy of New Boston, Michigan July 22, 1933 in Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church on Union Street in Plymouth. The Rev.

Frank LeFevre was the official. The young couple lived briefly in an apartment on Starkweather St. until purchasing their first house at 638 South Harvey. After the birth of son Kenneth the family moved to 643 North Harvey. Two months following the birth of their fourth son Gerald, the Kisabeths settled at 9301 Haggerty in Plymouth Township. Foster & Bertha have had five children. The two oldest sons Kenneth and Gordon were born in Plymouth while the following three children, F. Michael, Gerald Lee and Barbara Kerry all were born in nearby Northville.

The Luthern (Evangelical) faith has stood for eleven generations in the Kisabeth/Kisseberth household since Foster's eight great grandfather Alexander Kisseberth (Kuschwert) started following the teaching of Martin Luther in the mid to late 1500's. Foster converted to the Catholic religion in 1952 and became active in the men's fraternity the Knights of Columbus. He was Financial Secretary for the local council #3293 for a number of years and the Kisabeths were chosen "Family of the Year' in 1983 by the Supreme Council in New Haven, Connecticut. Fos was instrumental in forming the Catholic Bowling League back in the 1940's and after 55 years his team (Curly's Barber Shop) is still active only under a new sponser.

In 1989 Foster visited the "Fatherland" for the first time with his son's family and had the great pleasure of meeting his 3rd & 4th cousins; Wilhelm Kisseberth & Dr. Fritz Kisseberth.

Foster still returns at least twice a year to the Ohio area and has been honorary chairman of our Annual Family Reunion since 1991. He and wife Bertha now reside in a beautiful apartment in Livonia, Michigan and like to visit his brother Bob and his wife Jimmye on Kiawah Island, South Carolina for a week's long game of Euchre.

Besides traveling as a hobby Foster enjoys visiting the K of C Hall. He has been a renowned philatelist for years specializing in stamps from New Zealand and Greenland. He also is known for his First-Day Cover collection. Fos also is a avid numismatist with his area of expertise being Canadian Coins. He has specialized in the United Nations stamps for quite a number of years.

As of this writing (1997) Foster is in great health and keeps very busy with his time. Foster was 88 years young last May.

Helen Caryl Kisabeth was born February 14, 1944 in Erie. Pennsylvania. She was the fifth of six children born to Everett LeRoy & Essie Evelyn (Cook) Kisabeth. It is said that her mother was a descendant of King Canute, a Danish King who ruled England during the 9th & 10th centuries. In 1966 Helen married Paul Allen Love and gave birth to 3 children; Mark William (1-27-68), Lance Matthew (8-21-70), and Jeanette Lynn (4-24-72). Helen suffered from Manic Depression most of her adult life which probably contributed to her being estranged from her family of the sons and daughter, now adults living in lowa. Helen was an independent person, highly principled and a hard worker. She worked as an administrative secretary for Southeastern University & The U.S. Soil Conservation Service in Washington, D.C. and in Fort Collins, Colorado.

Helen was an avid student and reader of philosophy and nature; also a talented artist & writer. She took a disability retirement in 1994.

Helen Caryl Kisabeth passed away on March 16, 1997 at her Green Bay, Wisconsin apartment from a massive heart attack.

In her memory, Helen's brothers and sister have donated \$100 to Kisabeth History project. She always spoke highly of this endeavor. Helen Caryl Kisabeth was 53 years old..
